





Reading Role Models

I recently read 'HappyHead' by Josh Silver. HappyHead is a facility for 17 year olds who have the potential to be happy, but aren't. Our protagonist, Sebastian, is not happy and he's desperate to make his parents proud by succeeding at HappyHead, but all is not as it seems. The big quote across the front of the book reads "Like The Hunger Games but better". Sums it up really. The teens at HappyHead end up competing in some pretty sadistic challenges, all for the promise of real happiness. Sebastian starts to question the methods of his new minders guite early on, and pairs up with another of the teens to try and uncover the truth lurking beneath the Shiny Happy People surface. It's a really well paced story. The ending leaves loads unanswered, but that's ok because the sequel is coming really soon. You can be sure I'll be reading it. As well as just being a really entertaining story, Silver also tackles some big issues that are very relevant to it's teenage audience.





CyberFirst Investigators 2024

Inspired and led by the National Cyber Security Centre (NCSC) - a part of GCHQ, **students** in Year 8/9 in England and Wales and Year 9/10 in Northern Ireland and S2/S3 in Scotland, can join free cyber security development days running throughout February and March 2023.

The CyberFirst Investigators 2024 initiative is designed to increase understanding of the different specialisms within cyber security and equip students with valuable, in-demand skills.

There is a series of fun, interactive face-to-face one-day courses as well as virtual courses, to choose from. On the day, the girls will be role playing as cyber security experts working for a fictitious app company, Sirius Cyberworks. Unfortunately, disaster has struck and there has been a serious breach of the company network - a new flagship app has been leaked. The students role is to work through four different parts of the company, uncovering how the leak happened whilst learning new cyber skills along the way.


